Alderman Watson said that the police could not be allowed to chose their own stations, or there would be an end to all authority or all order in the force. The prisoner should be sent to jail for a month.

**AWFULLY SUDDEN DEATH.**—On Sunday last, a man named Patrick Meara, a broker and carman's-stage keeper, in the Old Claro-street, attended last Mass in the parish Church of St. John's, when, towards the conclusion of Mass, he took suddenly ill, and expired immediately after the rights of the Church were ad- ministered to him by the Rev. Mr. Halpin.

The Ballingarry December fair was held on Thurs- day last, and, considering the season of the year, a very good one, as regards the show of stock. Sheep rated high, and every other description rather lower. Fat cows fetched 40s. per cwt.. In-calf heifers ranged from £8 to £9 5s. Calves from 50s. to 62s. 6d. Fat sheep brought so high as 6d. per lb.; and bonhams about £1 each. The attendance of buyers from a distance was very thin, but this, probably, is owing to the strange fact that this, the last of the three annual fairs of Bal- lingarry, is invariably omitted from the list of fairs, published in several of the Irish almanacks. For up- wards of three years these markets have been estab- lished—one is held on Whitsun Monday, the second in October, and the third on the 11th of December in each year.

About twelve months ago a swarm of bees forsook a hive at the gardens of Kileooly, and lodged in a cre- vise of the richly groined roof of the old abbey on the estate. There they remained—strange inmates of that time-worn building—and during the last summer the little colony busied themselves in forming their comb and filling its cells with their luscious hoard. Depend- ing from the roof several flakes of white comb may now be seen, but it is so ingeniously worked into the crumb- ling ruin, that it requires a close observation before it can be discovered. Close to the abbey, the largest whitethorn tree, perhaps in this country, now flourishes; it measures seven feet six inches in girth, and covers a wide area with its spreading branches; there are se- veral others growing around of somewhat smaller di- mensions, and it is computed that they have stood for upwards of a century.
