CATTLE AUCTION AT SCARTEEN NEAR ENNIS.—This extensive sale came off yesterday; it threatened about 12 o'clock to be a wet day, but it most propitious. The attendance of people from near and distant parts was very great; the muster of comfortable looking farmers and purses gave expectation of competition, which was fully realized during the auction. The sale commenced at 12 o'clock and every lot sold before 4. The stock, which consisted of calves, to calve between February and March, ranged about 13l. per head—many however from 15l. to 19l. each; some yearling calves 5l. 15s. each; farm horses from 8l. to 19l. 15s. each; and dairy utensils brought excellent prices. The entire property was cleared away and all settled by 6 o'clock. The auction was conducted by Messrs. Marsh and Son of this city to the satisfaction of all parties.

Wm. Finch Esq. of Tullamore Park, a large landed proprietor, suggests the formation of a line of railway from Nenagh, to unite with the Castle Connell line, and meet the Southern and Western on the Limerick Junction.

On Tuesday last Mr. Costelloe Coroner, held an inquest on the body of John Ryan of Cross, a fine able bodied and respectable farmer, who came by his death from taking poison on the previous day. It appeared that about three weeks ago he went to an Apothecary's shop, to purchase some medicine, but that instead of medicine he got poison by mistake. He did not however use it until last Monday, when after having partaken of it he was seized with a violent pain, and died in the most excruciating torture. It is to be regretted that no neighbouring Magistrate attended to take his dying declaration, and in the absence of legal evidence the Jury found that he died from the effects of poison taken by mistake.

A great Tenant Right meeting was held on Thursday in Castlebar, which was attended by three thousand persons. Speeches were delivered by Messrs. Moore, Swift, and Kennedy, M. P's. &c., and several Roman Catholic clergymen.

Mr. Preston Newenham has resigned his office of perpetual high sheriff of Adelaide, salary £900 a year. He has arrived in Cork after a residence of 19 years at Adelaide. On his arrival there the population only amounted to 210 persons; on his departure 24,000.

ATTEMPTED SUICIDE.—This morning about nine o'clock, a young man who gave his name as Thomas Ryan, discharged a pistol loaded with heavy slugs at his own head, while standing at Barrington's bank. He was observed loading the pistol by some of Messrs. Russell's men, who strove to deprive him of it, but before they could do so he fired it off, but in the confusion and excitement of the moment, he fortunately failed to effect his purpose. The slugs perforated his cap, and grazed the skull, only entering so far as to cause a little blood to flow; the cartridge having blown in his face, caused him to bleed profusely from the mouth and nose. He was taken into custody by Constable Frawley, and has been sent to jail until Monday, as he refuses to give any account of himself. He is supposed to be out of his mind, and will assign no cause for the attempt on his life.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—On the evening of Thursday last, Mr. Garrett Cotter, for many years chief boatman in the charge of the Ventry Coast Guard Station, was accidentally drowned, when passing the western ford at Ventry strand, within half a mile of the station. It appears he went to Dingle for the pay of the men, and returned towards home early in the day, as the station is about five miles to the west of the town, and crossed the strand with day light. There are large blocks of stone placed across the river, which are used as steps, and the tide rises some height over those steps. When crossing this ford, it appears he missed one of those steps which are always covered at high water, and, melancholy to relate, was drowned. The body was found after night-fall by a man named Stephens, a little distance to the east of the river, left dry by the tide, which was on the turn at the time.
