At Kingstown, Jamaica, on the 20th ult. to the deep regret of all who knew him, Dr. James Darrac, son of our respected fellow-citizen, Mr. Joseph Darrac, Patrick-street. This gifted and highly esteemed young gentleman was but recently appointed on the medical staff of the Army in the West Indies, and had only arrived in Jamaica a short time when it pleased Providence to call him to an early grave, in the 33d year of his age. He had served with the Army thro' the Crimean campaign, and attended most diligently to the poor sufferers in the hospital at Scutari. He has left a wife and two children to bewail their sad loss. He arrived in Kingstown on the 23d of December, and, in less than a month afterwards, he was stricken down with the fatal epidemic, yellow fever, which has raged with virulent, unsparing effect for some months in Jamaica, and before which many who had survived the pestilential climate of that colony for a series of years, have fallen. His last moments were most edifying; and the accounts received of them from the Vicar Apostolic, the Rt. Rev. Dr. Dupeyron, SJ, who himself conveyed the sad intelligence in a most consolatory and pious letter to his family, could not be more grateful to the sorrowing hearts of his friends. He possessed the full use of his senses to the last, and those lessons of religion which he had well and truly studied at home, were not forgotten when he was conscious that his last hour was quickly approaching. The Rev. Father Howell, SJ, administered to him the last sacraments, which he received with the utmost fervor. His remains were buried with military honors in a separate place of the Catholic burying ground of Kingstown, where a suitable tablet will be erected to his memory.
