## DEATHS.

On the 18th of February last, at Calcutta, after a residence of 23 years on active service in India, including the Afghan-istan war, and capture of Cabul, Nelson Dartnell, Esq. Surgeon of H M 53d Regiment of Infantry. Possessing a kind and warm heart, affectionate, generous, and affable disposition and manners, he was beloved, and will long be deeply regretted by a large circle of relatives.—Esteemed and respected by his brother officers and acquaintances generally, he made many friends, and had the proud satisfaction of passing through life with a high, honorable, and independent mind and character. His professional and literary talents were of a very superior order, and his application and zeal in the discharge of his duties not to be surpassed. His health had been for some time declining from the effects of the hot and damp climate of Bengal. He has left four daughters to deplore his loss, his wife having been killed by lightning in India eight years since—was nephew to George Dartnell, Esq. of this city, and youngest brother of Mr. Dartnell, of Newcastle, and of George R. Dartnell, Esq. Deputy Inspector General of Hospitals.

On Sunday last, in Dublin, of typhus fever, aged 24 years, Bridget Josephine, the beloved wife of Patrick Joseph Burke, Esq. and second daughter of William Purcell, Esq. Limerick. Out off while yet in the flower of youth, the demise of this amiable young lady leaves her family to mourn in the deepest affliction the loss of one of its most beloved members—the fond wife, the affectionate daughter, and the loving sister.
