PROTESTANT YOUNG MENS' ASSOCIATION.—This Society had a very crowded meeting on Monday evg., when the Rev. Mr. Reichardt, a most distinguished Missionary to the Jewish people, delivered a very interesting account of the country, the people, and the progress of the Christian mission amongst the inhabitant of Palestine. The Rev. lecturer in many of his incidental details forcibly and beautifully illustrated various passages in the Old and New Testaments. The gentleman was listened to with most profound attention by a very large assembly of ladies, gentlemen, and clergy. Mr. Franklin was in the chair. There was a very considerable collection at the doors.

PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD OF DUBLIN.—The annual meeting of the Synod of Dublin commenced on Tuesday; the attendance was good. After a sermon and devotional exercises, conducted by the outgoing moderator, the Rev. S. G. Morrison was chosen moderator for the present year. The reports of the Presbyteries of Athlone, Connaught, Cork, Dublin, Bailieborough, Munster, and Newry, for the past year were read.—The subjects which principally occupied the attention of the court were—the various mission schemes and congregational collections, the state of education, and ministerial support. Where congregations had not made the collections as appointed, the Synod ordered the respective Presbyteries to take steps that the collections be made previous to the meeting of assembly in July. Deputations were also appointed to visit forthwith all congregations whose attention had not been directed to the subject of ministerial support.—The court was much gratified to know that many congregations had, of their own accord, moved in this matter. Reports from all such congregations were given in, from which it appeared, that in some cases there has been an increase during the year of fifty per cent. on ministerial income, and that in others the contributions have been doubled. On the motion of the Rev. Richard Dill, seconded by the Rev. David Wilson, the Synod will meet in Limerick, on the second Tuesday in May next. The proceedings of the Synod, which continued for two days, were appropriately concluded on Wednesday evening, by a missionary meeting in Ormond quay church, when several ministers from the south and west delivered interesting addresses.

THE BISHOP OF LONDON AND THE TRACTARIANS.—On Sunday morning last the Bishop of London preached in the church of St. Barnabas, Knightsbridge—the notable place of worship in which, of all others in the metropolis, Puseyism is most rampant, and of which the Hon. and Rev. Mr. Liddell is the incumbent. The Rt. Rev. Prelate chose as the subject of his discourse a text which, on its simple announcement, must have very considerably fluttered the Tractarians, who assembled in large numbers on the occasion. It was the well known verse in the Corinthians:—"For neither circumcision availeth anything, nor uncircumcision, but a new creature." The Rt. Rev. Prelate denounced, in terms of the most uncompromising kind, the peril as well as the folly of substituting a mere ritualism for the great verities of the Gospel—those cardinal truths which can alone regenerate the nature, and save the soul; and then, in explicit and emphatic language, he charged the parties conducting public worship in that place, and those who took part in its Popish mummeries, with being guilty of the offences which he had pointed out. The sermon of the Bishop produced, as might be expected, a powerful, and, as regarded many who were present, a very unpleasant sensation.—*Morning Advertiser.*
