May 20th, Thomas Francis, third son of Thomas Barry, Esq. of North Great George's-street, Dublin, and Caherline House, in this county—a most promising young gentleman, and deservedly lamented.

We have to record the death of an old and respected citizen, Mr. Joseph Darrac, last night, at his residence, No. 7, Patrick-street, Limerick. It has caused deep regret to the wide circle of his acquaintances, by whom he was regarded, esteemed, and honored for his many excellent and amiable qualities. He had reached the age of 68 years, nearly 50 of which he spent in this city—a useful, a charitable, and exemplary citizen, taking an active part in every public movement, obtaining the affections of all who knew his excellent disposition, and educating a highly respectable family in the first order. The unexpected death of his son, Dr. James Darrac, in the West Indies, occasioned him a shock against which he strove in vain to sustain himself; and, after being confined for a few weeks to his room, where all that medical skill could effect was resorted to in the hope of restoring him, he yielded his spirit to his Creator, surrounded by his sorrowing children including the Rev. J. W. Darrac, CC. St. Michael's, all of whom honored and loved him as the most devoted of parents. The remains of the lamented deceased will be removed on Monday morning at 8 o'clock am, for interment in the ancient cemetery of Killilee.
