Capt. Crawley, not Lieut. Greetham, 15th Hussars, has been appointed aide-de-camp to Lieut. General Sir Harry Smith, commanding the troops in the Northern District.

The Senior United Service Club has passed a bye-law prohibiting the members from dating or addressing any communications to the papers or periodical from the Institution.

Major-General Straubensee and Staff embark for Hong Kong in July.

The 16th Regiment of Foot, under Major Coppinger, and whose Depot is stationed in this city, have arrived from Quebec in Dublin, and are staying at Linen Hall Barracks.

Major-General Cator, on promotion to that rank, has retired from the service. He commanded the Royal Artillery in this district for two years.

Captain Braybrooke of the Military Train has retired.

The 7th Fusiliers will not leave England 'till about the beginning of July. The 88th and Third Battalion of the Rifles embark about the same time.

A circular has been issued by the Secretary for War to the effect that the number of Non-Commissioned Officers allowed on the Establishment of the Permanent Staff of the Militia being in several Corps still incomplete, his lordship, with a view of affording greater facilities for their completion in this respect, has approved, as a temporary measure, of the transfer of soldiers from the regular army to the staff of the disembodied Militia, after 18½ years service, instead of 20, as heretofore.

A board of three officers, Major Briscoe, President has been ordered to assemble at Canterbury Barracks to report on the new carbines issued to the 2d and 3d Dragoon Guards. They are perfectly useless. This is really too bad, as the 2d Dragoon Guards proceed to Umballa immediately, and the 3d Dragoon Guards, embark for Kirkee in August. The ammunition issued for these carbines is also of too large a diameter.

Major Carlyon, of the 3rd Dragoon Guards, is not to be promoted without purchase to a Lieutenant Colonelcy, as customary on a regiment proceeding to India, but one of the Half Pay Colonels is to be brought forward.

The Queen will distribute the Victoria Cross, in Hyde Park, on the 26th inst.

Over 100 men from different regiments in Ireland have joined the 7th Fusiliers, ordered to India.

The depot of the 16th expect an order to join head quarters in Dublin.

There are 16,000 enrolled pensioners now which cost less than the support of one regiment of the line.

The 31st regiment have arrived at Gibraltar

It is in contemplation to form a Corps for service at the Falkland Islands from Volunteers from certain regiments of the line. The men must have been in the service 15 years, to be married, and have not less than three children. The period of service is to be for six years, at the expiration of which they will be

On Sabbath next, the 21st inst. Professor La Harpe of Geneva, will preach in the Presbyterian Church, Glenthworth-street, at 12 o'clock, and in the Independent Chapel, Bedford-Row, at half-past six o'clock on behalf of the Continental Society. The learned Professor is the associate in the school of theology of Geneva of Danbigne, the distinguished historian of the Reformation. The object of the Continental Society of which Professor La Harpe is the advocate, is to collect funds to aid the Evangelical Societies which labour on the Continent to make known the blessed Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ.

There were fifty presidents of provincial conferences of St. Vincent de Paul societies in Dublin on Sunday, at a meeting, which was presided over by Sir John Bradstreet, Bart.

The resignation of Dr. Newman as rector of the Catholic University of Dublin, first announced in the CHRONICLE a month since, is now officially published.

Right Rev. Dr. Ryan, R. C. B., presided at the reception of Miss Barry into the French Convent, Laurel Hill, on yesterday.

The consecration of Dr. Leahy as Archbishop of Thurles, will take place in Thurles on Monday evening.

£187 was collected in Glin on Sunday last towards the erection of St. John's New Cathedral.

A great many Roman Catholic congregations in England and Ireland have petitioned against the abominable Divorce Bill, now going through the house. The Protestant Bishops are also adverse to it.

Archbishop Cullen's name was the first attached to the petition in the Dublin Metropolitan chapel, in reference to the Oaths Bill.
