took part, after which the House divided, when
the numbers were—For the motion, 115; against
it, 266: majority against the motion 151. Lord
Palmerston and Mr. Disraeli opposed the motion.

The Rev. T. Godfrey Day, rector of Kenmare, has
been appointed to the Union of Dromtoriff by the
Bishop of Limerick. Kenmare which is a Government
living is worth £250 per annum.

The amount of fines levied by the City Limerick
Magistrates at their Courts for the past three months
was £412. This is somewhat beyond the usual average
for the quarter—as the amount includes some fines
levied for breaches of the revenue laws. Nevertheless
making allowance for those deductions, the amount of
fines levied at our local courts is sufficiently large, and
important to awaken public attention to the advisi-
bility of following up the move originated in the
Limerick Corporation, some short time ago, by Ald.
Watson for the allocation of those fines to relieve the
pressure of local taxation. The yearly amount of fines
paid in Limerick is about £1,000, which at present
goes into the consolidated fund, but we are quite sure,
that, on a proper representation to Government, a
change would be procured, which would transfer those
fines to local purposes. We earnestly invite the at-
tention of representatives in Parliament to a subject
which should not be lost sight of.

We are glad to hear that the eldest son of our res-
