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waters, was extremely beautiful. There were about five hundred tourists on board; and from the cliffs over the bay they were loudly cheered by the people who occupied them. The Malakoff is certainly a noble boat, and well she did the duty assigned her. As she was leaving Milford Haven on Saturday morning, she found a dismasted vessel of about 200 tons burthen at the islands at the entrance of the Haven. The vessel had lost anchors and cables, and was holding on by a mooring chain under circumstances of extreme peril. The Malakoff brought the vessel into Milford. She was the wreck of the Brian Borou of Liverpool, and was delivered over to Lloyd's agent by Captain M'Grath, whose claim for salvage is said to be very considerable. The Malakoff reached Waterford at 6 p.m. Lords Waterford, Dunraven, Adara, and Doneraile, were among the passengers on Saturday to Waterford by the Malakoff from Milford.

The Niagara and Agamemnon are expected in Queenstown this day or to-morrow, each having half the Atlantic cable on board. They will then sail in company from Queenstown to the middle point between Ireland and Newfoundland, where they will proceed to deliver their wonderful burthen, sailing in contrary directions—each towards her own country. The Imperial yacht of France having on board a representative of the Napoleon family will witness the arrival of some of the finest specimens of the navies of the two greatest maritime powers in the world. It was first supposed that the Niagara and Agamemnon would proceed to mid ocean, and there take opposite directions, but it is now ascertained that they will proceed in company, and as soon as the first half from Valentia shall have been laid, another vessel will then take it up and continue the work to Newfoundland.

There are seven transports for the conveyance of troops to India at present lying in Kingstown harbour. The Lord Lieutenant visited them yesterday.

The late mail from California brought the melancholy intelligence of the death by drowning in York river of Mr. Malachy Curry, son of Mr. Joseph Curry of this city, and nephew of Mr. Eugene Curry of Dublin, the celebrated Irish Antiquarian. The deceased young gentleman was employed in the Poor Law Commission Office, Dublin, before leaving this country for Australia, whence he had gone to California. The strict sobriety, integrity, and steadiness of his conduct won for him the regard and esteem of his employers while his quiet unassuming gentlemanlike deportment, and suavity of manners endeared him to all his friends and acquaintances.

A fashionably-dressed young girl aged about 16 years, who described herself as niece of the Rev. John Elmes, and went by a variety of other aliases, has been picked up by Constable Nash, and remanded till Friday on a charge of obtaining money under false pretences from several respectable families in the neighbourhood of this city, she stated she was collecting for the Protestant orphans—"lying like truth and yet most truly lying."
