 Macauley, 1st West India Regiment, was next ex-
 d with the view of disproving the fifth charge

 commands of Lieutenant Colonel J. S. Hill. Be-
 being examined Captain Macauley was warned
 the Deputy Judge Advocate that he was not
 ed to answer any questions that might criminate
 self, as that officer is under arrest and will be tried
 general court-martial for disobeying the orders of
 el J. S. Hill. The witness stated that the pri-
 had never advised him to disobey the commands
 Colonel Hill, neither had Col. Clarke ever forbidden
 to obey Colonel Hill's orders. There was no con-
 cy between witness, the prisoner, and the late
 ain Pearson to mutiny, and if there were any dis-
 between Col. Hill and any of the officers of the
 West India Regiment, it was not the result of the
 ner's interference. Captain Pearson assumed the
 and of companies on the occasion of the prisoner

 officer as before. Witness had not seen any

 s of that letter were not known in the garrison

 d by all the officers that the prisoner commanded
 troops stationed in Africa. Lieutenant G.
 rne, 1st West India Regiment, the prisoner's ad-
 nt from 1854, until appointed to the general staff,
 next called and examined for the defence, with the
 y of proving the great inconvenience which ac-
 d to the service by Colonel Clarke being suddenly
 away by Colonel Hill to take the command in the
 bbia; but after a few questions had been put to
 witness by the prisoner, the court adjourned until
 a day.
