The Post's Paris correspondent says that intelligence from India is more gloomy than published in the English journals. A high authority that our enemies assert the rebels to be no European direction, and that strategical operations have commenced to prevent the union of the forces. A French correspondent, writing from the 22d of August, says the British army may anticipate two years' fighting. The authority declares news to have reached Calcutta all parts of India, asserting that the natives cannot be depended on.

The Galway election inquiry discloses a vast amount of corruption and bribery.

Of our 105 Irish members, seventy-three are on the black list for bad attendance during the session.

Imprisonment for debt will be abolished at the next session, which is to be brought forward at the assembling of Parliament.

The expenses of bankruptcy are enormous, almost every case amounts to one-third of the assets.

Seventeen foreign vessels arrived at Waterford last week with bread stuffs.

The shop of Mr. Allen, of Newport, was robbed Saturday night of 20s.

There is a vegetable Marrow exhibiting the name of Mr. O'Leary, of Tipperary, grown in the garden of R. M. S. Mansergh, Esq., Greenan, which weighs 19½ pounds, and measures 1 foot 6 inches in circumference.

The Bank of Ireland are about to open a branch at Queenstown.

The Dublin Indian Relief fund amounts to £1000. Bandon fair is being held to day. We thought the 'loyal borough' had more respect for her Majesty's command.

Belfast monthly fair has been postponed to-morrow, in consequence of the proclamation.

Some excitement had been caused at Gibraltar, a Spaniard having been shot at and killed by a private of the 92nd Highlanders. The Spaniard was placed in charge of the sentry by the local authorities for smuggling, but he escaped out of the sentry and not coming back when called on, the sentry and shot him at about 90 yards distance, striking him in the back, killing him instantly.

On the occasion of the mutiny of the 14th N.I., at Jhelum, Captain W. Miller, of the 5th Fusiliers, charged a body of twenty five mutineers, at the head of five sowars only. He himself, it is said, unarmed. His horse was shot under him, and he received two bayonet wounds ; but, we are glad to hear, cut up the mutineers, and a man. Capt. Miller is doing well.
