BY BANDITS NEAR ROME.—Some three we noticed the departure from Ireland of Rev. Robert French Whitehead, D.D., of the Roman Catholic College, Maynooth, his relative, Maurice C. J. Blake, Esq., and Valentin O'Connor Blake, Esq., Lower Mayo, en route for Rome. By letters, which have been received in town, it appears that at the place where they were joined by a bishop, Right Rev. John O'Brien; by two priests, Rev. Mr. Carroll and Rev. Mr. O'Brien; and by a young gentleman named an ecclesiastical student, who was going to Rome, the intention of becoming a clergyman; the party having taken their places on board the steamer, arrived safe at Civita Vecchia, and that, midway between Civita Vecchia and Rome, they experienced an adventure as unpleasant as unexpected. The carriage in which the party travelled was attacked by a gang of robbers, who rifled the party of all the gold and silver they had, and a valuable gold watch and chain from Mr. Blake, who had a miraculous escape from being shot. The letters to which we refer, furnish in the following details of this perilous occurrence. When the party arrived at Civita Vecchia, it was too late, by the time their baggage was taken to engage their seats in the Diligence, and they were also a gentleman and his lady, named Mr. and Mrs. Harpur, similarly circumstanced; and as they did not wish to stop for the night at Civita Vecchia, they agreed to take a carriage and proceed to Rome. It was twelve o'clock before arrangements were made for starting. They arrived at a small inn called Paolo, which is just half way between Civita Vecchia and Rome. Here the driver stopped for an hour and a half, in order to feed his horses; and while the party dined at the inn. It was six o'clock p.m. when the party left the inn, and when they had driven onwards four miles, the banditti jumped from behind the hedge, and fired at the horses. The driver, who, the party concur in saying, was concerned in the affair, instantly threw the reins on the ground. The banditti consisted of seven men, armed with bludgeons, pistols, and knives. Mr. Blake was sitting in front with the driver, and one of the party in the coupe. One of the banditti fired up to Mr. Blake, and struck him a slight blow on the left arm. On this Mr. Blake drew
