**LIMERICK UNION.**—Mr. John Barrington presided  
this day at the weekly meeting of the Board of Guar-  
dians. The number of paupers in the house on last  
Saturday was 1,234; a letter was read from the com-  
missioners stating that it was illegal for the board to  
give money to paupers to proceed from one union to  
another.
