have subscribed £20 to the Tipperary race fund.
Twelve horses will start for the first match on Wed-
nesday.
The bets in this city upon the result of the election

£55,000 has been granted by the Treasury to the

Since the Limerick Steam Ship Company have ar-
ranged to have their London steamers called at Tralee
for cargo, the goods traffic on the Killarney Junction
Railway has fallen off by about one hundred tons per
week.

On Wednesday last, Daniel Foley, Esq. agent o
Lord Sandwich, was accidentally killed near Grange,
in this County, while riding a spirited horse through
the demesne. It appears the animal took fright, ran
amongst the trees, threw Mr. Foley, who, while
on the ground received several severe kicks about the
head and face, which caused instantaneous death.—
The fatal occurrence is much deplored by all who knew
Mr. Foley, who was a worthy gentleman.

Lord and Lady Gough, the Hon. Captain Gough,
