The Bishop of Cork presided on Monday at a meeting, held in the Imperial Hotel, in furtherance of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel.

The annual meeting of the Gort Auxiliary of the National Association for relief of the deaf and dumb poor of Ireland was held in Gort School-house, on Thursday. A deputation and a pupil from the Claremont Institution attended the meeting. The chair was taken by the Very Rev. the Dean of Kilmacduagh. After the meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. James Fowler, the travelling secretary, the Dean addressed the meeting on behalf of the Institution in a very luminous and impressive manner, pointing out the origin of the society, the progressive improvement of the system of instruction, and its peculiar adaptation to the wants and necessities of this afflicted portion of the human race, and the strong and imperative claims of the institution upon the public support. After the conclusion of the Dean's eloquent address, the pupil was examined not only by the Rev. James Fowler but also by several persons in the meeting, and by the pupils of the Gort school, in the bible, arithmetic, geography, and the several branches of trade and manufacture, and the answering and practical knowledge of the deaf mute gave most general satisfaction. The several resolutions expressive of approval of the system of education and its claims upon public support were moved and seconded by the Rev. H. Fry, Rector of Kilkeedy; the Rev. John Jackson, New Quay, Co. Clare; the Rev. G. A. Heather, Ardeacon Rectory; Thomas Keane, Esq. After the Doxology was sung, and the blessing pronounced by the Dean, the meeting separated highly gratified and edified by the proceedings, and resolved to give the institution their most cordial support.
