EXECUTION OF JOHN CULLINAN.—This day at 12
 o'clock, John Cullinan, convicted at last county assizes
 of the atrocious murder of Elizabeth Giles, at Ardagh,
 in April, underwent the extreme punishment of the
 law, on the gallows in front of the county gaol. The
 execution having taken place at so early an hour, the
 crowd of spectators was exceedingly small. The
 wretched man was escorted to the scaffold by the Rev.
 Wm. Bourke, P.P, Rev. Mr. Fitzgerald, Rev. Mr.
 Quinlan, and Rev. Mr. Halpin. From seven o'clock
 this morning, the Rev. Mr. Quinlan was in constant
 attendance on him, and imparted to him all the con-
 solation that religion could afford ; and it is gratifying
 to add that Cullinan was perfectly reconciled to meet
 the untimely doom allotted to him by law, acknow-
 ledging for a long time past the commission of the
 crime and the justice of the sentence. As the proces-
 sion moved on by the tower to the front of the prison
 he prayed fervently, and though evidently feeble and
 much dejected, he was calm and resigned. Having
 reached the fatal spot where his sufferings in this world
 were to terminate, he ascended the drop, whereupon
 the executioner adjusted the rope around his neck, a
 cap was drawn over his face, the bolt was drawn, and
 he was launched into eternity a few minutes, dying
 almost without a struggle. The body, having sus-
 pended for an hour, was taken down and buried within
 the precincts of the gaol. The wife of the unfortunate
 sufferer mingled in the crowd, with his child in her
 arms, and loudly lamented his untimely end. The
 city police, under Sub-Inspector Macleod, were on
 duty before the prison.
