Henry Watson, Henry Maunsell, J. W. Mahony,

the County Petty Sessions on Thursday. Michael

Twenty-one parties were fined for various breaches

At the City Petty Sessions Court yesterday—the
magistrats presiding were—Henry Watson, W. Har-
