The report that the Prince of Wales was to remain at Rome for three months is incorrect, as he is now at Osborne, and will shortly inspect the County Limerick Militia at Parkhurst barracks.

The South Tipperary Artillery, will not be moved to its destination, Portsmouth, until towards the end of January.

Lieutenant Story has been dismissed from the North York Militia, for having absented himself from the training of the regiment.

Lieutenant Lloyd, of the 1st West York Militia, having obtained a first class certificate, has been appointed Instructor of Musketry to that regiment.

The Rev Mr. Woodward lectured in the Protestant Hall, on Tuesday, on Missions; and, on Tuesday next, the Rev. Mr. Maxwell, of Askeaton, will lecture on Rome, and the Redemptorist Fathers.
