### DEATHS.

On this morning, at Killeely Glebe, the Rev William Lewis,  
aged 92 years. He was universally respected in every relation  
of life, and stood high in the estimation of all creeds and  
classes. As a Christian minister, he laboured zealously in the  
vineyard of the Lord, and by his example, no less than his  
teaching, inculcated those precepts of Divine love taught in that  
Sacred Volume, of which he was an earnest expounder. His  
charity flowed with generous bounty, and the poor, whose wants  
he was daily in the habit of relieving, will long have cause to  
mourn the loss of one who was to them so kind and constant a  
benefactor. The amiability of his temper and the evenness of  
his disposition endeared him to a large circle, who lament a  
sincere, earnest, and attached friend.

On Thursday last, in Upper William-street, aged 77 years, to  
the deep sorrow of his attached family, Charles O'Hara, Esq., of  
the firm of Charles O'Hara & Son—a citizen highly and deserv-  
edly respected and esteemed, for his sterling integrity and  
honourable character. He had been one of the firmest sup-  
porters of the cause of independence in Limerick, before reform,  
and his sympathy for the cause, for which the citizens heartily  
struggled, was manifested in the most substantial forms. He  
was a sincere and practical Catholic, most exemplary in every  
relation of life, and his demise is universally regretted by all  
classes of his fellow-citizens. His humility, charity, and  
affability of manner endeared him to all. Totally exempt from  
political and sectarian acerbity, in him were blended the true  
Christian and courteous gentleman. Long and well prepared to  
meet his Maker, after a life of energy and prosperity, his end  
was happiness and peace. With truth can it be said—"He was  
the noblest work of God—an honest man." Mr. O'Hara was  
a member of a highly respectable and ancient family in the  
county Antrim, and settled in Limerick more than half a cen-  
tury ago.
