Frequent complaint has been made of the shameful  
state of the road leading from the railway station at  
Patrickswell, to the village, which is in such bad con-  
dition that no one can travel it, either on foot or by  
car. The station itself has been badly chosen—so  
much so, that parties prefer walking into Limerick by  
the Ashbourne line, rather than wade inches deep  
through mud and mire to the railway, a distance of  
nearly two miles. The company ought to suit public  
convenience, and if no change is made in the station,  
a pathway ought to be made from thence to Patrick-  
swell.

On Tuesday, a respectable old man, named Patrick  
Dunworth, fell into the river near Kilmallock, and  
would have been drowned but for the gallant conduct  
of sub constable M'Loughlin, who was passing con-  
venient to the place, and being attracted to the spot  
by the cries of the sufferer, he jumped into the river

in bringing him safe to the bank.

SUDDEN DEATH.—Mr. Patrick O'Shea, solicitors  
clerk, dropped dead suddenly in Ellen-street on Sun-  
day evening, about 6 o'clock, while conversing with a  
labouring man, named Murphy. On falling, O'Shea  
was conveyed to a stable lane in Ellen-street, and after  
a short time removed to Barrington's Hospital, where  
every effort was made to restore animation, but with-  
out success, as the vital spark had fled. An inquest  
was held on the following day by Thomas Costelloe,  
Esq., coroner. It was elicited on the evidence that  
deceased was sober when he was seen to stagger, and  
after falling to snore heavily for a few minutes. From  
Dr. Bourke's testimony it appeared that life was quite  
extinct when deceased was brought to the hospital,  
and judging from the congested condition of the head,  
face, and neck. Dr. Bourke was of opinion that death  
was caused by apoplexy. The jury returned a verdict  
accordingly.

At the city police court, on Monday, before H.  
Watson, S. Roche, E. Gabbett, and P. G. Barron,  
RM, Esqrs—Patrick Cooney was ordered to pay a fine  
of 15s. or to be imprisoned for 14 days for drunken-  
ness and assaulting the police. A number of vagrants  
brought up for begging in the streets and at the different  
houses of worship on Sunday, were sent to gaol for 7  
days each. About a dozen parties charged with drunk-  
eness were fined.
