The principle broadly laid down by the House of Commons, that the borough franchise should not to be lowered is specially injurious where a larger number of intelligent and men are shut out from the enjoyment of rights than in any other part of the United Kingdom and where many boroughs can only be saved from disfranchisement by increasing the number of Electors.

If you do me the honour of again electing me I shall vote for an extension of the franchise that protection to voters, which alone can be exercised in a safe to themselves and the country.

I shall continue to devote my best exertions to the improvement of the relations between the Tenant, and I shall be ready to support any liberal measure for providing compensations for improvements.

I shall insist on Religious equality and tend for the maintenance of civil liberties especially for the pure and impartial administration of justice—I shall always be the advocate of economy in the national expenditure—tending to economize the national expenditure—form administrative abuses—to secure the best use of Irish talent by extending the system of examination—to develop intellectual and to secure the fair administration of the law and to secure the fair administration of the law appropriated to education.

I have implicit confidence in your kind feelings towards me; and now, for the first time, respectfully solicit your suffrages.
