ROYAL PROCLAMATION.

Her Majesty the Queen, in pursuance of the Proclamation, which declares her intention to abdicate the throne in favour of her son, with all Sovereigns, Powers, and Princes, has determined to abstain altogether from any part directly or indirectly, in the Kingdom of Sardinia and France. Her Majesty's subjects are strictly commanded to observe neutrality. The Act of Geo. III. relating to enlistment or engagement of subjects to serve in a foreign service, and the Act relating to the equipping in British dominions for warlike purposes, without the sanction of Parliament, are quoted, with its penalties of forfeiture of protection; and all British subjects are prohibited from committing acts in violation of the Act, especially by breaking any arms, accoutrements, or ammunition, by carrying officers, soldiers, or military stores, or any contraband of war for either party at war. All persons so offending shall be liable to capture and its consequences, and shall have no protection from her Majesty. Signed at St. James's Palace, 13th May.

This morning at four o'clock 100 military and constabulary left this city, to augment the force in Bruff owing to the disturbances which took place yesterday.

The Rev. Mr. Gubbins, R.O.C., was attacked by a mob when returning from the house of the Parish Priest of Hospital, on Thursday night; he was struck and hooted, and would have been murdered were it not that he took refuge at Kilfrush house.

Extract of a letter from Kilnallock:—

"I have only time to say a few words about Election doings in this locality. Rev. Joseph Gabbett, Mr. Weldon, Mr. Lowe, and Mr. Townsend, and others were pelted with mud and stones when passing through town this morning. Mr. Weldon was badly treated. Captain Coote was also pelted. Several voters belonging to Colonel Dickson were stopped here, and turned home by the mob. Major Crone, Byblox, Doneraile, came by the mail train, and was proceeding to Bruff, when he was met outside town and beaten; he has a few cuts; he had to return again into town and get an escort. Near Garryspillane, about 200 of Dickson's voters were turned back by the mob; a trooper's horse's leg was broken; the cars which were conveying the voters were also broken, and several other casualties occurred. The Scots Greys left here this evening to join the available force in Bruff, whence they proceed to Knocklong and Garryspillane to escort Dickson's voters to the poll, on Saturday. One of the troopers stationed here has a bandage on his head, having sustained injury at Bruff in the early part of the day. As I write at ten o'clock, p.m., the mob are in possession of the town, quite drunk, and have it all their own way, and are shouting against the police, &c. There are only a very few police in town, and, as I before informed you, all the army left for Bruff."

A fatal accident occurred at Oula Station, on the Waterford line yesterday, originating out of the County election. It appears that a man named Wm. Bowles had an altercation with John R. Heuston, in which the latter struck the former with a stick on the head. Bowles grasped the stick, and in an endeavour to wrench it from Mr. Heuston, was dragged upon the rails, the train passed over his body, killing him on the spot. Mr. Heuston is in gaol, and several of the rioters are also in custody. Mr. John S. Dwyer was the Magistrate.

The railway officials in this city are harassed from fatigue during the last fortnight, transmitting troops and constabulary by special trains in every direction.

Colonel Vandeleur and Colonel Luke White, were yesterday declared by the High Sheriff at Ennis, the sitting members for the County of Clare. They subsequently arrived in this city and proceeded to Dublin by train.

The High Sheriff of Clare plumped for Mr. Oalcutt. His doing so gave offence to agents of several estates who intended to split their votes, which would, it is stated, have put Mr Oalcutt in a majority.

Mr Fagan has resigned the representation of the city of Cork. Either Dr. Lyons, or Francis Leahy will be his successor, should a Conservative not appear.

The conservative members of Dublin, with their proposers and seconders, have been entertained by the Lord Lieutenant.
