**AWFULLY SUDDEN DEATH**—About half past ten o'clock on Tuesday morning this town was startled by the report that Mr John B Corneille, proprietor of the extensive grocery and seed establishment in Castle- street, had dropped dead. On enquiry, the sad news was found to be too true. It appears that Mr. Cor- neille was about to take a drive in the country, with his father, who only arrived on a visit to him a few days previously, and after breakfast retired to his room to dress. He had shaved and washed himself, and was about to draw on his trousers, when he fell down and suddenly expired. No one witnessed the melancholy occurrence, but in the course of about half an hour after he entered his room he was found by one of the shop assistants, who had business with him, lying on his left side on the carpet quite dead with his trousers by him. He at once gave the alarm, and Mr Corneille's father, who was waiting at the foot of the stairs for his son, rushed to the room, and the feelings of the poor aged gentleman (for whom the deepest sympathy is felt under his heavy bereavement), at finding him a corpse, when he expected to meet him in health and strength, may be imagined, but cannot be described. Medical gentlemen were at once called in, but life had to flown. Disease of the heart was the cause of death. Mr Corneille was in the bloom of life, and his premature and sudden demise has cast a gloom over all classes of our townsmen. He was a spirited and enterprising merchant a warm and sincere friend, and an active and useful citizen.—*Nenagh Guardian*.—[His remains passed through this city yesterday for interment]
