INCREASE OF CUSTOM DUTIES.—We have much
pleasure in announcing that the increase of Custom
duties at this port for the year 1858, was £15,085, on
corn, tea, sugar, and tobacco, which is ascribed, ac-
cording to the Commissioners' report of March last,
to the improved condition of the agricultural popula-
tion, and the improvement of trade generally in Lime-
rick. The receipts for 1857 were £157,737; in 1858,
£172,822.
