be sacrificed, his obstinacy led him to hold on until
both sank and perished. The fatal occurrence was
not witnessed by many, and those present did not
know how to swim. In an hour after the occurrence
the bodies were found, when the lamentations of
relatives and friends were heart-rending M'Namara
was only married six months. Begly has left a wife
and two children, and is near her confinement of a
