**FEARFUL ACCIDENT IN CLARE-STREET.**—On Wed-  
...nesday morning last, as the work people at a new  
...bacon store which was being erected for Mr. Trou-  
...dell, had nearly finished an arch in the establishment,  
...the roof and arch fell in, burying two masons, Mead  
...and Tyrrell, and two labourers, Frawley and Mack,  
...beneath them. After an interval of nearly an hour  
...and immense labour these men were extricated from  
...the sad position in which they were placed, and con-  
...veyed to Barrington's Hospital. A messenger was  
...sent for Dr. Gore, and every possible attention was  
...paid to the sufferers by the resident officer Dr. Burke,  
...and the other officials of the establishment; when Dr.  
...Gore arrived it was discovered that one of the mason's,  
...Mead, had his right shoulder and his ribs badly  
...broken, and his lungs seriously wounded; he was fear-  
...fully oppressed, and appeared in a dying way; the  
...other mason Tyrrell, had his back so injured that his
