**DEATHS.**

In Patrick-street, Cork, Brabazon O'Connor, Esq., for many  
 years Adjutant of the County Limerick Royal Regiment of  
 Militia. He was a gentleman of amiable disposition, kind  
 manners, and highly esteemed and respected by all who had  
 the pleasure of his acquaintance. A few days since he was in  
 the city, and looked in the enjoyment of robust health, though  
 advanced in years. He was born in 1759, and had conse-  
 quently attained the age of 101 years. His remains were in-  
 terred in Cloyne, on Monday. He was the only surviving  
 officer of the late County Limerick Regiment.  
 In the 17th instant, at his residence, Court Cottage, in this  
 county, in his 77th year, Thomas Frederick Rose, Esq., to the  
 deep regret of his family and friends.  
 At his residence in William-street, on Monday night, after a  
 brief illness, regretted by a large circle of relatives and friends,  
 to whom he was much endeared by an amiability of disposi-  
 tion seldom surpassed, William Hill, Esq., an old and respected  
 merchant of this city. His remains will be removed for inter-  
 ment to the Friends' cemetery, at Ballinacorra, on Friday  
 morning next, at 10 o'clock.  
 On the 5th December, 1859, at Dum-Dum, near Calcutta,  
 after 14 days illness, of a severe attack of dysentery, Captain  
 Simon George Newport, of 79th Highlanders, eldest son of  
 Captain Newport, of this city, and nephew of Henry Waller,  
 Esq., of Drishane Castle, county Cork. Captain Newport was in  
 his 36th year of age, was 18 years in the service, and was  
 wounded by grape shot when carrying the colours of the 39th  
 Regiment at the battle of Maharajpore, when under the com-  
 mand of General Lord Gough. He subsequently served in the  
 Crimea, and was actively engaged in the trenches at Sebastopol.  
 He was deservedly beloved by all his brother officers. His  
 remains were conveyed to the Cemetery of Dum-Dum, with  
 military honours, all the officers of the garrison attending. He  
 held the bronze star medal for Maharajpore, the Turkish medal,  
 and the Crimean medal, presented to him by her Majesty. By  
 letter from Captain Thackwell (son of the late General Sir  
 Joseph Thackwell), who never left him during his illness,  
 stated that he was progressing favourably for some days after  
 the attack, but a relapse took place, when he said, "I feel it  
 impossible to get over this, and I trust in my Saviour." He  
 then gradually sank into a state of unconsciousness, and died  
 peacefully. Captain Thackwell had kindly given directions  
 for the erection of a monument over his grave, as a tribute to  
 the memory of his late valued and intimate friend.

 was a young man of agreeable and obliging disposition, and  
 his death is regretted by a large circle of friends and acquaint-  
 ances.
