DEATHS.

We deeply regret to announce the death of Viscount Guilla-
more, of Cahir Guillamore, in this county, which took place on
Monday, in Dover-street, London, after a brief illness. His
lordship, who was only in his 28th year, was an officer of the
Royal Navy, the eldest son of the second viscount by a daughter
of the Hon. Berkeley Paget, and grandson of the Right Hon.
Standish O'Grady, many years Chief Baron of the Exchequer
in Ireland, who was raised to the Irish peerage in 1831. The
late lord was born in 1832, succeeded to the family honours in
1843, and married in 1853 Ada, daughter of the late Mr Arthur
Blennerhassett, some time M.P. for the county of Kerry. By
his death the families of the Marquis of Anglesea, Lord Gort,
Lord Massy, the De Montmorencies, Norburys, &c., are placed
in mourning. The unexpected demise of his lordship is
lamented and deplored by the nobility and gentry, while a
numerous tenantry bewail his loss.

Harding Ryves, Esq., aged 65. He was the tenth of the Ryves
Castle family, who had inherited the estates in the county
Limerick, in lineal descent, and was for many years a kind and
