On Monday, at the residence of his father, North Strand, to
the inexpressible grief of his family, Mr. Stephen O'Donnell,
jun., aged 25 years. From an early age the deceased gave un-
mistakable indications of rare talents, coupled with strong de-
votional feelings. His life may be said to have been divided
between religion and literature, the former constituting with
him the very end and aim of existence, whilst in reading and
the cultivation of a refined literary taste he placed his chief
relaxation. Gifted with a lively fancy, and possessed of a mind
stored with a prodigious amount, for one so young, of varied
and useful learning, which a singularly tenacious memory en-
abled him to retain, he was a most agreeable and instructive
companion, whilst his intensely warm and affectionate manners,
and a remarkably joyous and playful disposition made him the
idol of his home. To his parents, who beheld in him the pride
and honor of their household, his early death is a trying be-
reavement, for if ever parents were blessed in a child, they
were; yet it should help to assuage their grief that from his
cradle to his grave his life was a continuous stream of unsullied
purity, and that in parting with a beloved child they are but
giving a saint to Heaven. His love of religion had led him to
enter the Society of Jesus, of which, had God spared him life,
he would have become a brilliant ornament; but Providence
willed otherwise, and the illness which has terminated in his
death sent him back to a world from which his soul, impatient
of delay, has now passed to the abodes of eternal bliss.
