**DEATHS.**

At the early age of 31 years, at Woolwich, on the 6th instant, Major Vandeleur, R. A., much respected and esteemed both in his native county (Clare), and by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. To his amiable lady, the daughter of J. Mofony, of Kiltannon, Esq. J. P. D. L., it is a sad bereavement, and to his young family the death of such a parent is an irreparable loss. A number of influential families in Clare are placed in mourning by the sad occurrence.

On Sunday night, at his residence, Charlotte's-quay, after a short illness, of rheumatic fever, Michael Ruttle, Esq. proprietor of the City Bakery. In his business relations he was strictly upright, while those in his employ sadly deplore the loss of a considerate master, whose object it was to promote the comfort of the working classes; and, in proof of the services rendered by him in abolishing night and Sunday work, we publish in another column a letter from the operative bakers, bearing testimony to his worth. This morning the remains of the deceased gentleman were conveyed for interment to the family vault at Nantenant, in this county, the funeral cortege being most respectable.
