in your impression of the 28th instant Mr. Stawell writes—Had I read his letter of the 13th instant (I presume he meant to write 14th instant) with attention, I should have seen that he expressed his readiness, if necessary, to adopt the straightforward course of publishing my letters. I have read and re-read the letter referred to, and cannot find any such intention announced in it; however, I give the rev. gentleman the credit of fancying he said so, or at least intended to convey as much, and that drawing on his imagination for his facts, he now asserts that he did state so. Why, therefore, has he not carried out his declared, or rather intended to be declared, intention? Is it that he fears that by doing so he would enable the public to form a correct estimate of the value of his assertions, perhaps I should say of the accuracy of his memory. If he can be so very inaccurate respecting what he wrote a week or ten days since, I do not feel the least surprise that he should be equally so as to what he said, now considerably over two years since, more particularly as there was no one present at our conversation.

Mary M'Mahon, wife of a wood-ranger to Sir Vere de Vere, at Carrachase, died suddenly in her bed on Sunday night last. An inquest is to be held.

The Mayor, Eugene O'Callaghan, Thomas Boyse and Doctor Kane presided in the Police Court this morning. Anne O'Dea, a charwoman, and Julia Hayes, an old woman and professional cup-tosser, were charged by Constable Connolly,—the former with stealing a large quantity of bed clothing from Mrs Kennedy, Cecil-street, and the latter with aiding in disposing of them. The former pleaded guilty, and was sentenced to three months' imprisonment with hard labour, and the latter to a month's imprisonment.—Mr John Considine, grocer, Patrick street in this city, charged a young man, named Joseph W. Tully, with appropriating the sum of 16l. to his own use under the following circumstances:—He gave the defendant the sum of 19l. odd to pay for goods to be purchased in the house of the Messrs. He replied—"all right."
