DEATH OF THE MAYOR OF LIMERICK.

It is our painful duty to record the unexpected and almost sudden death of Alderman William Fitzgerald, Mayor of Limerick, which melancholy event took place at his residence, 116, George-street, and has cast a gloom over the entire City. In the prime of life and vigour of manhood the hand of death has snatched from his young and interesting family and relatives as amiable a gentleman as ever adorned the domestic circle. The speedy termination of his earthly career has come with surprise upon the citizens at large, as up to half-past ten o'clock Wednesday night he mingled with his friends, in his usual good health and spirits, and attended a meeting of the Council of the Athenaeum, in the success of which institution he at all times manifested a deep interest. Ardently attached to his wife and children, Alderman Fitzgerald's premature death has caused a sad and sorrowing bereavement which time alone can eradicate, possessed as he was of all the enobling qualities which constitute the basis of domestic bliss ; while, as a gentleman of great talent and business acquirements, his qualifications for the office of Mayor were of a high order ; and, as his acts proved, the selection by the Corporation of Alderman Fitzgerald as chief magistrate of Limerick was judicious and praiseworthy. On the Bench, and in the Court of Conscience, his decisions were just and satisfactory ; his conduct in private and public life was amiable, and worthy of imitation ; and he had only just embarked in an exertion to raise a fuel fund for the poor when it pleased God to terminate his existence at the early age of 84 years. The public at large deeply deplore the loss of so worthy and philanthropic a Mayor, whose brief career gave such hopeful promise of future worth. The citizens have creditably evinced their deep regret upon this occasion, the city presenting a scene of mourning in every quarter, the window shutters being up as a mark of respect. The Mayor got up on Thursday morning for the purpose of attending the funeral of the late Alderman Sheehy, and was seized with apoplexy, caused by the rupture of a blood vessel of the head. He was insensible from the moment of the attack to the hour of his death, which was at two o'clock yesterday morning. His attending physicians were Doctors Russell, Gelston, and Wilkinson. The remains of the lamented gentleman will be interred on Monday morning in Munchin's Church, the Corporation attending. Much sympathy is felt for his respected father, David Fitzgerald, Esq., who was justly foud of a devoted son, such an ornament to society.
