DEATHS.

It is with deep regret we announce the death, on Christmas-
 Day, at Kilpeacon Rectory, to the inexpressible grief of his
 bereaved wife and sorrowing children, after a long and painful
 illness, borne with unmarrying submission, of the Rev.
 Edward T. Herbert, aged 67, for 37 years the faithful and de-
 voted minister of Kilpeacon. It may truly be said of him,
 "he fell asleep in Jesus." This greatly lamented clergyman
 faithfully, during life, followed his Master's example, in "going
 about and doing good." In him society has sustained a loss;
 he was amiable in all the relations of private life, and in his
 public character, as a minister of Christ, zealous, modest, and
 unassuming. The memory of the deceased will be long che-
 rished by the poor, to whom he was a friend and benefactor.
