Magistrates present—John Augustine Levers, E. J. Armstrong, Benjamin Cox, John Scott, and Thomas Keane, Esqrs.

The first case called and disposed of was, Thomas Keane, Esq., v. Wm. Flynn, for a breach of the peace at Kilkee on the 20th of September last, ordered to be sent to gaol for a fortnight at hard labour. John Crowe, v. Timothy M'Grath, jun., for a wilful trespass on the complainant's potatoes on the 27th ult., left to the arbitration of Mr. Thos. Sheedy. John Bouchier, Esq., v. Mr. Henry Jacob, for abusive and insulting language, dismissed. Mr. Henry Jacob, v. Mr. Samuel Scott, for an assault, dismissed.

Mr. Wm. Raleigh, officer of excise, v. Mr. John O'Donnell, of Kilkee, for selling wine and tobacco without license on the 2nd August last. After a long and lucid exposition of several acts of parliament by Messrs. Michael Kenny and Bryan Purcell, who appeared for the defendant, a fine of 5s. was imposed.

The same complainant v. Mrs. Margaret Shannon, for selling tobacco without license on the 2nd August last, fined £1.

Same complainant v. Thomas Foley, for letting a horse to hire on the 2nd of August without being licensed, fined £12 10s.

Same complainant v. Teresea Warren, for selling tobacco without license on the 2nd August last, fined £12 10s.

Same v. Malachy Foley, for letting to hire a horse without being licensed, fined £12 10s.

Anne Collins, v. Patt O'Neil, for a violent assault, fined 6d. and 19s. 6d. costs, or 14 days in gaol at hard labour.

A few persons were fined in mitigated penalties at the suit of the police. Several persons were summoned for wages, and after the hearing of which the court adjourned.

Sir John Arnott, Mayor of Cork, not satisfied with taking the water works of that city into his own hands, and under an arrangement which will give the poor of that city plenty of water free of rates, has also undertaken to water the streets gratis. Truly, Whittington, who was "thrice Lord Mayor of Great London," is nothing in comparison to the princely Arnott, who may be called with truth and in fact "the father of his city," and held up as a pattern for the heads of other municipalities.

A branch of the United Kingdom Joint Stock Bank is about to be established in Cork; and it is expected a branch will be also established in this city.

As an illustration of the immense importation of grain lately effected by France it is stated that a firm at Marseilles, that of M. Elis Petit, has made in brokerage alone above £60,000 sterling this year.

The *Massilia* with the Bombay and Mauritius mails arrived at Malta at 9 p.m. on the 1st inst. and was to leave for Marseilles at 2 o'clock the next morning.—The *Delta* with the heavy portion of the mails, was to leave Malta at 10 p.m. on the 1st, and may be expected at Southampton on the 10th inst. The *Oriessa* brought the mails from Bombay, and the *Herma* those from Mauritius arriving at Suez on the 26th and 27th ult. respectively.
