DEATH BY DROWNING OF CAPTAIN LLOYD .- Deep regret was felt by all classes in this city on vesterday. when intelligence reached of the death, by drowning, in the river near Castle Connell, of Captain Arthur Lloyd, Royal County Limerick Militia, son of Eyre Lloyd, Esq., J.P., Prospect. The accounts given as to the circumstances under which the melancholy and fatal accident occurred were conflicting, but as regarded the sad occurrence there was no doubt, and the universal grief which prevailed at the untimely fate of this much respected and promising young officer, denoted the high estimation in which he was held. It appears that Captain Lloyd was crossing the river in a cot. from his father's residence at Prospect, to Doonass side, accompanied by a small boy, who steered the frail craft with a paddle, while he worked with a pole, in the usual way of propelling boats over the rapids, which are now very strong, and the waters unusually high, owing to the late continuous floods. At a short distance from shore, at the Clare side, the cot ran upon a snag, or sally tree, which grew in the water, and the stump of the tree having holted the bottom under the stem of the boat, water commenced flowing in to such an extent, that he leaped from it into the tree, but the branches being weak he could only hold on being deeply immersed in the river, where he remained until exhausted, and just as a man who observed his perilous position was running up the fields to render assistance, Captain Lloyd let go his hold, and endeavoured to swim to shore, but failed in the attempt having got into a powerful current, and sank. At this moment the man referred to rushed into the water and grasped the good young gentleman by the head, but the hair being short, he failed to retain his hold, and the result was the drowning of Captain Lloyd. The boy who accompanied him remained in the boat and was saved. Every exertion was at once made to recover the body by the people of Castleconnel; nets, &c., were put into requisition by Messrs. Hartigan and Enright, and at three o'clock (two hours after the sad calamity) it was picked up by Mr. Madden, post-master, and his assistants, and conveyed to the residence of his father, assistants, and conveyed to the residence of his father, which he had so shortly before left in vigorous manhood, lively spirits, and buoyant heart. The respected family of the deceased have been plunged into poignant grief by this deplorable and unexpected catastrophe, which has also east a mournful gloom over the locality where it occurred; and, as regards the expressions of sorrowful regret by his brother officers, and the noncommissioned officers of the corps to which he belonged, at the sad fate which befel him, we are at a loss to describe them.

This day Thomas Costelloe, Esq., coroner, held an inquest on the body, when a verdict of accidental death was returned.

The remains of Captain Lloyd will be interred on Monday morning in the family vault at Castleconnell.
