charge of Commander R. Stokes, has made a trial of her speed at the measured mile, under the superintendence of Captain Broadhead, Mr. G. Murdoch, Inspector of machinery of the steam reserve, and Mr. A. Murray, chief engineer, and other officials from the dockyard. It was considered a very satisfactory trial—her average speed being 14 5/4 knots, with partly Scotch and partly Welch coal; whereas the Warrior was supplied with the best Welch picked coal. The Black Prince still remains at Spithead; she will come into the harbour to-day. Her present draught of water is 21ft. 11in. forward, and 24ft. 2in. aft; and it is fully anticipated that when all to rights, and she leaves the harbour again, her speed will be greatly increased.

Mr. Hancock, curate of Bournea, to succeed. The living of Shinrone is the second best in the diocese, and, according to rule, falls to a Cork clergyman.

The Rev. R. W. Forest, of Cork, preached an eloquent sermon in the parish church of Nenagh, on Tuesday, in aid of the funds of the Church Mission Society. There was a large congregation present. The collectors were—Sir Wm. Osborne, Bart., High Sheriff; Captain Holmes, and John Bennett, Esq. The collection amounted to £10.
