ARREST FOR MURDER.—Our readers are familiar with the particulars of the brutal mutder recently committed near Oula, in this county, when the life of John Quillinan, a respectable farmer, was sacrificed by, it is alleged, a man named Patrick Hayes, against whom a Coroner's jury found a verdict of wilful murder, and a warrant was issued for his arrest. In our last publication we published a reward list from the tenantry of Colonel the Hon. Richard Hare, for the apprehension of the perpetrator of the foul deed, and have the satisfaction to announce that upon same night (Saturday) Hayes was arrested by the police near Cappawhite, county Tipperary, while sitting by the fire in a farmer's house, smoking his pipe. His capture was quietly effected, without any resistance whatever, the offender being unarmed. He made no statement whatever as to his guilt or innocence, and upon yesterday morning was brought into this city by railway train, in custody of Sub-Inspector Enright, of Cappamore, and four of the Constabulary, by whom he was lodged in our county gaol for trial at next assizes. The man did not exhibit a callous demea-nour, but on the contrary, was downcast and silent. He is of dark complexion, rather tall, determined countenance, dogged disposition, and aged about 28 or 30 years.

The following letter from one of the tenants upon Colonel Hare's estate, who subscribed to the "de-claration" published in the Chronicle of Saturday, places beyond doubt the honest feeling of the tenantry in coming forward as they have done in this unfortunate transaction :-

1st December, 1861. Honorable Sir-I have the pleasure of informing you that Hayes is arrested since last night—he passed by my place last night; my servant saw him with a double gun in his hand; I at once went to Doon to the police, and they collected the force and pursued the course I directed; he made to Cappawhite, and was taken before the Doon men had time to reach him.-I am, your obedient servant,

> WARLIKE PREPARATIONS.—A large portion of the vessels sailing for New York are carrying large quantities of rifles and other arms for the Federal Government, and a considerable number are in course of shipment during the present week, as no proclamation has yet been issued prohibiting the trade.

The Daily New has been assured that orders were issued yesterday to put 10 frigates into commission and to man them immediately. This intelligence is not confirmed.

FALL IN CANADIAN SECURITIES.—The depreciation in Canadian Government bonds has proceeded so far as to attract great attention. The 5 per cents closed yesterday at 90 to 92, being about 4 per cent. worse than Monday, and showing a total fall of nearly 12 per cent. since the dispute with America. The 6 per cents, fell 2 per cent. yesterday, and the downward tendency extended to the securities of other colonies.

The Timss says the number of able seamen enrolled in the reserve would enable us, with the ordinary additions of hands always procurable, to send to sea at once a fleet of 30 line of battle ships. The naval reserve is daily receiving additions, and is in a most satisfactory condition.
