### AN SOCIETY OF CIVIL ENGINEERS.

On Wednesday evening, the 31st inst., a meeting was held in the Freemasons' Hall to their anniversary, Mr. Mylne, on the occasion of his becoming a member of the Society. About 100 members, including visitors, sat down to a dinner, and Mr. Wm. Gravatt, the president, took the chair.

The standard toasts of the society were proposed by Mr. Mylne, who first touched upon the history of the Society, which was founded in 1771, by Mr. Mylne, for the purpose of encouraging civil engineers, and through social meetings, a friendly interchange of views among men of science and the profession. Among the early members of the society were Messrs. Watt, Jessop, Whitworth, and Stephenson. A graceful notice of the merits and disposition of the worthy treasurer was read, and praise was given for his constant exertions in maintaining the high position of the Society, in reply to which it was one of the highest compliments to see his professional brethren joining in compliment; that the society had ever shown great interest to him; and he had endeavoured to maintain its character, and to oppose parties. After a long life, he was able to find such warm feelings of regard

as proposed "The Visitors" in a brief address, which was replied to by Mr. Robert Chamblind, alluding to the peculiar gratification that he enjoyed in being favoured with the opportunity of paying a visit of regard to his friend, he could not refrain from alluding to the long line of engineers and architects that the Scottish race of Mylne had produced. He could speak with certainty to nine generations, with every reason to believe that the source of deep gratification to Mr. Mylne in his hereditary profession was still common to the Vice-President of the evening. The meeting terminated in the name of the visitors. It broke up at a late hour.—*Builder.* [Mr. Mylne was complimented, as engineer of the new Waterworks Company of London, the largest waterworks in the world, Fellow of the Royal Society, and the Limerick Waterworks Company, and the directions the vast extension of works in progress, and whose experience and skill were appreciated.—ED.
