That the greatest evils ften proceed from the best things being abused or Il applied, is exemplified in this case, and we should lasten to correct the parent error from which the vils we have pointed out have sprung. A noble geneal cause should not suffer by a mistaken favour conerred on an undeserving locality; and therefore we ejoice to hear that the Packet Station may be transerred from Galway to Foynes. While the former was vaunting its natural advantages, and doing nohing to make them available, the Shannon still kept even tenor of its way, and the railroads also kept approaching its borders, till the communication was perfect between the mouth of the " noble " river and the great towns of the north, the east and the south of our keland. It is now in a position to receive, and do ample justice to, any postal service with which it is favoured - Tratee Chronicle
