MONETARY AND COMMERCIAL.

In the foreign exchanges, yesterday afternoon the rate for Paris was again higher. Other places same as last post.

The Daily News City Article says the funds yesterday were favourably influenced by the character of the Bank returns, by the rise on the Paris Bourse, and by some large purchases. The market was buoyant and closed at an advance of ¼ per cent.

The new Turkish loan will be introduced next week. The colonial produce markets during the week have not presented any features of interest, a want of animation being still apparent in the general tone of business.

Traffic returns of railways in the United Kingdom, week ending 15th March, shows an increase of 237½ miles, and a decrease of £11,485 as compared with last year. The falling off is more than five times as much in goods and minerals as in passengers on the great lines. The receipts of the past week show an increase of £11,407 over week ending 8th March.

QUEENSTOWN SHIPPING.

Arrived—H.M.S. Emerald. Wind NE., fine.

An inquest was held this afternoon in Caloony-street, by John Gleeson, Esq., Coroner, on the body of a fine little boy, aged 3½ years, son of Private Breen. 17th Regiment, whose death on yesterday resulted from a severe burning received on Thursday. It appeared the mother had occasion to go out on business, and locked the child in alone; the little innocent went too near the fire place, its clothes ignited, and the injuries sustained caused death. Verdict—Accidental death.

A telegraphic despatch received in Dublin last night states that steps have been taken to lodge a petition against the return of Major Myles O'Reilly. Monday is the last day for petitioning against the return.

REPRESENTATION OF KINSALE.—It is rumoured that Sir John Arnott is about to retire from the representation of Kinsale. The Cork Examiner has been informed that a letter to that effect has been received in Kinsale. The object is supposed to be to make way for the Attorney-General, whose presence is required in the house to assist in the transaction of Irish affairs.

It was then put from the Chair, that the deputation proceed, en galia, and leave Limerick on Monday evening—meet the Mayor at the Hibernian hotel on Tuesday morning, at 11 o'clock, and from thence to Dublin Castle.

CITY PETTY SESSIONS—YESTERDAY.

The presiding magistrates were—Alderman Quinlivan (Chairman); Aldermen M'Donnell and Mahony, R. M'Mahon, E. O'Callaghan, John T. MacSheehy, Wm. Phayer, Wm. Johnstone, and M. Gavin, Esqrs. Timothy O'Connor was charged by the Constable of Thomond-gate police station with being a vagrant. The governor of the jail reported that the accused had been convicted of larceny, and sentenced to 6 months imprisonment and was only out of prison two days. The prisoner in reply to the bench said that he was from Kerry, and was trying to pick up a living in town. He was ordered to return to Kerry without delay for if caught in the city after the expiration of 24 hours he should be sent to jail with hard labour for 28 days. He then decamped.

Joanna Darling, a tall woman, wearing a Toledo bonnet, and exhibiting her hands encased in black leather gloves which she carefully exhibits at the corners of streets when politely and sotto voce soliciting alms was sentenced to 7 days imprisonment with hard labour.

Bernard Enright, another solicitor of eleemosynary aid, and who was "bearded like a pard," was sentenced to 14 days imprisonment, with hard labour, for begging in the streets.

An ex-recruiting serjeant, named Brown, was sentenced to pay a fine of £2., or in default one month's imprisonment, with hard labour, for drunkenness in the public thoroughfares, assaulting two policemen by kicking them, wounding a third policeman in the hand with a knife, and threatening to beat a fourth into a mummy. The defendant said that the constables did not address him politely and as they ought, and he merely wanted to teach them manners and was doing so when the row arose.

The chairman said that the police did not want a Chesterfield to teach them manners, and a too polite policeman would be of no use particularly when he would have to encounter a drunken recruiting serjeant whose conduct was so exceedingly outrageous that the magistrates would have sent him to jail for one month, with hard labour, and without a fine, but hearing that he would lose his situation on the staff, if they did so, they would impose a fine of £2, or a month's imprisonment. The fine was paid in the course of the day, and the serjeant was allowed to go at large.

John Sheehan was charged with having interfered with the police by undertaking to show them how to arrest a drunken man, and so far did his zeal carry him beyond discretion that he tore off the skirt of a constable's coat. —Fined 10s. or 14 days' imprisonment.

Catherine O'Grady, an old and degraded woman, who keeps an infamous brothel in King's-lane, was charged with stealing a gold watch and chain, the property of a man who patronised her den, but whose name did not transpire, and who did not come forward to prosecute, and, as a matter of law, the old wretch was discharged; but as she had suffered two years' imprisonment for keeping a brothel, the Justices put her under a rule of bail of £20 to give up her wretched establishment within one week, or to come in and surrender in discharge of her bail, and take her trial on the charge of keeping a house of ill fame.

John R. Anderson, Captain of an American ship now in the river, and discharging her cargo, was summoned by seven of his crew for wages.

Mr. Doyle, solicitor, appeared on the part of the captain, and submitted that according to law and the express terms of the shipping articles, the sailors were not entitled to their wages until the ship's cargo was discharged. In this case the cargo was still abroad, and that being so, the Justices should dismiss the case.

The Bench held with Mr. Doyle, and adjourned the case for a further hearing when the cargo is discharged.

John Anderson, an able seaman on board this ship, was charged by his captain with threatening to knock the "dead lights" out of him, if he did not give him money and his clothes to go ashore for a larking cruise. The captain said he refused to comply with the requisition so saucily put to him, and so words running high, he was obliged to have the accused arrested by the police.
