Mr. William Lysaght Secretary to the Society for holding the annual show of the Royal Agricultural Society of Ireland in this city next Autumn, has left town to attend the show of the Dublin Agricultural Society, in order to enlist contributors for the forthcoming exhibition.

An inquest was held on yesterday in the board room Barrington's hospital, by the City Coroner, John Gleeson, Esq. on view of the body of a poor man named John Cahill, aged about 22 years, and who resided in Palmerston. It appeared on the evidence that the deceased was subject to epileptic fits in one of which he fell into the fire and before he could be rescued was severely burned on the shoulder, back, and breast. He was conveyed to the hospital where he died at 4 o'clock on Sunday. Verdict accidental death.

ELECTION OF BARONY CONSTABLE FOR LOWER ORMOND.—At the recent election of a High Constable for the Barony of Lower Ormond, which was held at Thurles, candidates were Messrs. Richard Biggs, Thomas Grey, and F. Kennedy. Mr. Biggs was chosen by a majority of no less than twelve of the justices. Captain Basil W. Holmes, and Mr. James Roche, merchant, of Wexford, have become security for Mr. Biggs, in compliance with the rule in such cases.

QUEENSTOWN SHIPPING.

Wind W.S.W., fine. Arrived—Evadne, New York; Consignment, New York; Forest Fairy, Saint Michael's, Cork, put back. Eleno, Havre.

For many years past there has not been such a large quantity of seaweed, as has been gathered during the past week in Kilkee.

At the Rathkeale butter market last Saturday, numerous buyers attended; Messrs. Healy, Slattery, and Fowler, Tipperary, made large purchases; Messrs. Ryan, Hogan, O'Brien, Hourigan, and M'Knight, of Limerick, were there also. There were over 200 casks offered for sale which were readily bought up at prices varying from 76s. to 50s. per firkin according to weight and quality.

An experienced farmer informs us that there is good prospect of an early and abundant harvest throughout this county. The wheat crop never looked better at this season; it is most promising from Newcastle West to Bruff, while the districts of Askeaton and Rathkeale are not behind in healthful appearance. Sowing of oats (he says) is nearly finished, and in consequence of fine warm southerly breeze and occasional showers, it is expected there will be an early and heavy crop. The land is fast preparing for mangolds and barley, and if the favourable weather continues for a short time everything will prove satisfactory to the husbandman.

The lovers of floriculture may now be delighted by a visit to Mr. Wilson's nursery, Roxboro' Road, where some of the finest and largest rhododendrons in the kingdom may be seen in full blow. We are informed that one of the same class of trees was sold to an English nobleman for £100, and two others for £250 in London some few years back. The citizens of Limerick seldom have such an opportunity of witnessing similar specimens. We are informed Mr. Wilson gives free admission to his beautiful garden.

It will be seen by our report of the City Quarter Sessions that Robert Hunt, Esq., High Sheriff, with his accustomed urbanity, induced the Chairman of Quarter Sessions to remit the fines imposed upon all absent jurors, under promise of a good attendance in future.

The Lord Lieutenant has subscribed £10 for the relief fund for the sufferers by the loss of the Mars.

Good Friday was observed in Kilkee with becoming devotion. There was service at the church at half-past 11 o'clock. At the Roman Catholic chapel, after the usual evening devotions which were observed during the lent, the Rev. Mr. Meagher, C.C., Carrigaholt, preached an eloquent and impressive sermon on the Passion to an overflowing congregation.

The Mayor, Wm. Johnstone, Wm. Phayer, and Stephen Roche, Esqrs., presided in the police court this morning.

A young lad, apprentice to a grocer in this city, was charged by his master with the theft of a half glass of whiskey which he gave to a shopman who had been discharged.

Mr. O'Donnell appeared for the master, and called on the justices to cancel his indentures. The master said, in reply to the Mayor, that he had received £30 fee with the boy, nevertheless he could not think of retaining him after this transaction. The £30 would not be sufficient for his keep during the 2½ years he was in his service.

The Mayor said that the magistrates could not cancel indentures where a fee of over £5 had been paid unless the parties mutually consented, and as he did not wish to brand the character of the young lad with the stigma of theft for so trifling an offence he would adjourn the case for a fortnight. The boy to return to his home with a view to having an arrangement made which might be satisfactory to both parties.

Some drunken cases were disposed of, and the court adjourned.

A meeting of the magistrates of Tipperary, was held at Thurles yesterday for the purpose of considering the propriety of amalgamating the Clough-jordan petty-sessions with that of Borriskane, inasmuch as no magistrates resided in the former petty-sessions district. After some discussion the further consideration of the question was adjourned until the next quarter sessions of Nenagh.

Colonel Edwards, C.B., 49th Regt., is appointed president of a General Court-Martial ordered to assemble at Chichester, for trial of Private John Cleary, 59th Regt., (a Tipperary man,) recently acquitted of shooting Mr. Outen, a student of Bishop Gilbert's College, with the particulars of which case the public is acquainted. The offence charged against the prisoner in the present instance is desertion, and abstracting an Enfield rifle and ammunition from the barrack-room at Colchester.

Lieutenant Colonel Seymour Blane, of the 52nd Light Infantry, has been appointed Military Secretary to the Earl of Elgin, the new Governor-General of India.

A War Office circular has been received at Chatham Garrison, announcing that the expenses of the non-commissioned officers attending as witnesses for the purpose of giving evidence before courts martial are in future to be borne by the different corps to which the witnesses respectively belong.

The 5th Dragoon Guards, who are at present under orders to leave Norwich, Ipswich, and Northampton for this country, received the "rout" on Thursday.

Two pensions for distinguished or meritorious service remain to be apportioned, in consequence of the appointment of Major General Sir W. Mansfield, and Major General Sir R. Garret to the colonelcies of the 38th Regiment and the 4th West India Regiment.

The Flying Cloud arrived on Friday night at Portsmouth from China. She brought Captain Montgomery 2nd Foot; Lieutenant Morris and Goslin, Assistant Surgeon Doran, and 112 men of the 60th Rifles; Captain Midhurst, his wife, and four children; Ensign Cotton and two men of the 99th Regiment, 11 men of the Hospital Corps, and 97 invalids. The Rifles landed at Portsmouth, but the remainder will proceed to Gravesend in the ship.

The undermentioned officers of the Commissariat Staff having arrived from the Cape of Good Hope, per last mail steamer have been placed under orders for immediate employment at the following stations:—Assistant Commissary-General Uniacke, London, (temporarily); Deputy Assistant Commissary-General O'Connor, Canada; Deputy Assistant Commissary-General W. G. Robinson, Aldershot; Assistant Commissary-General De Fonblanque, on leave from Malta, proceeds to Corfu, to relieve Assistant Commissary-General Henry Robinson, ordered to China.

The following removal of officers has been sanctioned in the Royal Artillery:—Capt. Burt, from Malta to England; Capt. McTernan, from Shorncliffe to Gibraltar; Capt. King, from Guernsey to Woolwich; Capt. Browne, from Dublin to Shoeburyness; Capt. Cuming, from Hilsca to Malta; Capt. Scott to Shorncliffe, on arrival from India; Captain Pitt; from Sydney to Hilsca; Capt. Wortham, from China to Portsmouth. An exchange has been sanctioned between Lieut. H. A. Mackay, of the 2nd Brigade, and Lieut. Spragge, of the Depot Brigade; also between Second Capt. Wolfe, of the 3rd Brigade, and Second Capt. Le Mesurier, of the 6th Brigade; also between Second Capt. Hamilton, of the 15th Brigade, and Second Captain King, of the Depot Brigade.

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
