The housekeeper of Mr. O'Donnell, on being sworn, stated that the defendant had been in the habit of attending Mrs. O'Donnell, and that she had entered on her services on Saturday, and had left without notice.

The Mayor observed that this was a very serious case, as it might lead to the loss of life.

Mr. M'Mahon said that the defendant ought to be severely dealt with, in order to show these people that they could not act in this way with impunity.

The Mayor said—The bench are unanimous in condemning this unnatural conduct of Mrs. Hartigan, and they feel obliged to Mr. O'Donnell for having the courage to bring it before the public, who must join with us in our condemnation of it. These kind of people are always treated wherever they go, no matter where, with the utmost kindness and generosity—they get the best of everything going. Many women's lives are depending on them and families look up to them with deference and affection; and it is too bad that such conduct as this should be charged against any one of them, and in order to mark our reprobation of it. We impose a fine on her of £3 with solicitor's costs and costs of court (£3 6s. 6d.), or in default of payment two months' imprisonment with hard labour.

Michael Ahern who is an incorrigible drunkard, was charged with stealing a sum of money from his mother. The prisoner said that he returned the plunder and his mother would not prosecute. The Mayor then said—Ahern you are a disgrace to society; you are a terror to the neighbourhood in which you live; you are a scandal to the city, and a heart break to your industrious, honest, and respectable mother, and as such I will punish you—I will now remand you for eight days.

Mayor—You shall not be there, and if you are brought before me again I will have you presented as a vagabond, and all the city know you to be one, you will then go before the judge who will transport you.

At Kilkee petty-sessions, on the 10th inst., before Thomas Keane and Benjamin Cox, Esqrs., Head-constable M'Carthy summonsed Pat Furnell for violently obstructing him in the discharge of his duties; fined 10s., or a fortnight's imprisonment, with hard labour. Several donkey boys were summonsed by the police for furious driving through the streets, to the annoyance and inconvenience of passengers; fines of 6d were inflicted in each case, mitigated at the instance of Mr. Keane on promise of better conduct by the donkey boys in future.
