I confess that I am a little tired after the long years of experience of a force in Ireland, a lecture has to be read to the court. If a prisoner makes a voluntary confession, after being cautioned, a constable is bound to report it; but he is not to interrogate a prisoner." His Lordship left the constable's evidence.

**STABULARY.**—William Frederick Winslow, Esq., Sub-Inspector, died on Friday, at Trim, after illness. Mr. Winslow was stationed for many years in the city of Kilkenny, where he was much respected. His death will place a cadetship at the disposal of the Lord Lieutenant, as Mr. Scott, the cadet at the depot, will be promoted to 3rd Sub-Inspector. County Inspector John Manley turned to Omagh, off leave of absence, and received official charge of the County Tyrone. Sub-Inspector Thomas Wyse has left Newtownbarry, in the County Wexford, to join his new station, Middleton, County Cork. Mr. Wyse is to be replaced in Newtownbarry by Sub-Inspector R. Fanning, who recently obtained a 1st class certificate at the School of Musketry, Fleetwood.

Colonel Luke White, in returning thanks to the citizens of Longford, says:—"Every species of violence and intimidation was put in force to prevent my return, and no candid mind can accept the result as an expression of freedom of opinion in the county. Such results were submitted to, there would be an interference with freedom of election; and I, therefore, feel it my duty to you to endeavour, by every means in my power, to expose practices of which I complain, and to store to you the opportunity of selecting, undisturbed by violence or faction, the representative of your choice."

The *Longford Journal* complains that priests at the late election, stood at every booth to "see" and "ar" the votes recorded; but mentions several instances committed upon Roman Catholic supporters of Colonel White:—"Thomas O'Farrell, Esq., of Ca, a respectable Roman Catholic, and uncle to Colonel O'Farrell, Esq., the Clerk of the Crown, for preying to promise or give a vote to Colonel White, his pew in his parish chapel torn up and broken in pieces, and if he acted as he ought, he should enter it (the chapel) till the pew was completely destroyed. On Saturday night a herd's house, newly built, the property of Thomas Gregory, Esq., the sub-officer, was burned near Newtown-Forbes, and many other minor acts of violence and mischief perpetrated by the few Roman Catholics and Protestants who were allowed to exercise the franchise and vote for Colonel White."

**RUNNING THE BLOCKADE.**—A Confederate steamer arrived at Queenstown on Saturday, she is the *nie Childs*, Captain Hammer, laden with cotton, iron, and tobacco, consigned to Messrs. Fraser, Fremelin, and Co., of Liverpool, from Wilmington, short coals, having run the blockade. She has on board a captain and crew of the ship *Kitty Cords*, abandoned on the 23rd of February, in a sinking condition. Oronhyatekha, a Mohawk Indian, 21 years of age, died on Saturday, the 15th of February, in the steamship City of New York, for Liverpool, on his way to Oxford, England, to finish his education under the auspices of Henry L. Acland, M.D., F.R.S., late physician to the royal party, and then and now Regius Professor of Medicine in Oxford University. On his arrival at Oxford he will enter immediately upon his studies.—*New York Paper.*
