There are some beautiful private resi-
 dences surrounded by peach trees, vines, bananas,
 and a variety of other specimens of the
 world. Teats are also met occasionally.
 The city is well selected; there is a grace-
 fulness of hill and valley; the noble river
 winds for a quarter of a mile in breadth,
 serpentine course through it, and insula-

parts of the town. The township is
 large; it extends over many square miles
 there is North Brisbane, South Brisbane,
 alley, Kangaroo Point, &c. As there is
 a ferry over the river, the people cross and re-
 turn by boats, paying one penny each time.
 There are two ferry stations, with several boats at
 each principal one often makes £10 a day. The
 tax it pays £900 a year to the government,
 six men, and has a good profit besides. I
 read several newspapers, which will save me some
 writing. The civility and friendly manner
 of the people here is well calculated to astonish a

The richest man in Brisbane (there are
 several) will chat with you as familiarly as the
 servant, and will tell you how he had to
 when he came to the colony.

Now say a few words about the much-dis-
 tinction, the climate of Queensland. It is now
 the beginning of Spring, corresponding to Febru-
 ary; and I have rarely felt the weather so
 warm as now in Ireland. What will our sum-
 mer be but the air is buoyant, bracing, and exhi-
 bit never feel the air oppressive, as at home;
 mornings and evenings are delightfully cool.
 At present are actually cold. Top-coats are
 worn morning and evening. You would
 think the inhabitants were humbugging you
 "cool day," when a scorching sun is dart-
 ing right on your head. All the inhabitants
 of the climate, and say the longer they are in the
 better they like it. Remember me to all
