Thus, in reaching you, Mr. Mayor, I am at a short distance, at least, of you so as to hold on by your skirts, and if I find that my ambition will be satisfied (hear, hear) to hold the scales of justice evenly between man and man, and to dispense alike to the right hand or to the left, no favour, or partiality to any man, and to discharge with the weight of these cares and part it will not be possible for me to perform any other weighty duties unless I have the support of this council, and therefore to the gentlemen who gave me their support I continue it to me during my year to enable me to get through it with credit and with credit to the council who (hear, hear.)
