**MONTHLY FAIR.**—The monthly fair held to-day, was not well supplied with stock, the agricultural operations going on at present occupying the entire attention of the farmers. The attendance of buyers was also exceedingly limited, and the result was that but few sales were effected. Milch cows, of which there were but few, brought from £13 to £20 each. Store cattle (for turnips) from £7 to £11 each; yearlings (very few), from £4 to £7, and weanings £4 each. Beef very scarce, and of middling quality, was quoted at 46s per cwt.; mutton, 5d. per lb.; lambs were as low as 19s 6d each; and bacon pigs from 40s to 46s per cwt.; slips, 30s to 40s; good strong stores £3; and bonnives (in creels) from 12s to 16s each.

Monthly fairs, toll free, are about being established in Tralee.

The annual ball in aid of the Cork Sailors' Home, is to take place on the evening of the 21st inst.

The buyers in attendance at Bruff butter market on yesterday, were Messrs. Dunne and Heuston, Tipperary, and Longbottom, Limerick, who bought up very spiritedly. The highest price given was by Dunkerly, £2 17s. 6d.

been openly stated by high authority in Washington that it was absurd to expect General McClellan to do more than at a level battle to crush his enemy, when all the recent levies that have reached Washington have not done more than supply the losses in the various battles from Cedar Mountain to Antiltan Creek.

The *Post* says peace seems less distant now than it was a month since. The administration of Mr. Lincoln topples to its fall, and we cannot doubt that it will be replaced by one which will consult the true interests of the American nation.

The *Daily News* says that President Lincoln's proclamation on slaves' emancipation has not, as far as at present appears, the importance which some persons in England are disposed to attach to it. Like most of the acts of the Executive of the United States it is feeble and halting.

#### ITALY.

##### THE DECREE OF AMNESTY.

TURIN, Oct. 6.—The official *Gazette* of this morning publishes the Royal decree of amnesty counselled by Signor Rattazzi. The decree is preceded by a report of the Minister to the King. The Minister in this report says:—"The motives which had compelled your Majesty to withstand the generous intention of your heart no longer exist. The rule of the law is again consolidated—confidence in your frank, but at the same time prudent policy, has moderated the impatience which had pushed Garibaldi on the path of rebellion by the catastrophe of Aspromonte. We could perceive that if, while fighting in your name, he would still achieve prodigious results, this could not continue to be the case when, having forgotten his duty, he took up arms against your rights, whatever might have been his ultimate intentions. At present Italy is reassured, and recalls the services rendered by Garibaldi, and wishes to forget his errors. This desire of the country is echoed by all the friends of the liberty and unity of Italy. When it was necessary to combat rebellion the Government proposed most energetic measures, but all danger has now ceased. The Ministry, therefore, becomes the interpreter of these generous wishes, and asks clemency from your Majesty. We should have wished to extend this amnesty to all who have participated in the insurrection, but the necessity of upholding the sentiment of military duty in the army prevents us from including soldiers who have deserted amongst those to whom pardon is granted. The honour of our flag forbids our taking extenuating circumstances into consideration in their favour.

##### (REUTER'S TELEGRAM.)
