recruiting serjeant, named Brown, was sentenced to a fine of £2., or in default one month's imprisonment, with hard labour, for drunkenness in boroughfares, assaulting two policemen by force, wounding a third policeman in the face with a knife, and threatening to beat a fourth man. The defendant said that the constables addressed him politely and as they ought, and he only wanted to teach them manners and order when the row arose.

The constable said that the police did not want a man to teach them manners, and a too-polite man would be of no use particularly when he is to encounter a drunken recruiting serjeant whose conduct was so exceedingly outrageous. The magistrates would have sent him to jail for his conduct, with hard labour, and without a fine, but that he would lose his situation on the staff, so, they would impose a fine of £2., or a month's imprisonment. The fine was paid in the afternoon, and the serjeant was allowed to go.

John was charged with having interfered with the police by undertaking to show them how to make a drunken man, and so far did his zeal carry him that he tore off the skirt of a constable.—Fined 10s. or 14 days' imprisonment.

Elizabeth O'Grady, an old and degraded woman, who kept an infamous brothel in King's-lane, was sentenced to a fine of £20 for stealing a gold watch and chain, the property of a man who patronised her den, but whose name she would not transpire, and who did not come forward to testify, and, as a matter of law, the old wretch was ordered; but as she had suffered two years' imprisonment for keeping a brothel, the Justices put her on bail of £20 to give up her wretched den, and take her trial on the charge of stealing, and discharge of her bail, and keep a house of ill fame.

John Anderson, Captain of an American ship on the river, and discharging her cargo, was summarily fined seven of his crew for wages.

John Doyle, solicitor, appeared on the part of the defendant and submitted that according to law and the terms of the shipping articles, the sailors were entitled to their wages until the ship's cargo was landed. In this case the cargo was still abroad, being so, the Justices should dismiss the

defendant, who attended on the part of the men, *in contra*—

The court then held with Mr. Doyle, and adjourned the further hearing when the cargo is discharged. John Anderson, an able seaman on board this ship, was ordered by his captain with threatening to knock "the lights" out of him, if he did not give him up his clothes to go ashore for a larking cruise.
