*For laying Stone or Brickwork,* 4 bushels of Sand to 1 bushel of Cement.

*For General Plastering,* 3 bushels of Sand to 1 bushel of Cement.

*For Reservoirs, Tanks, Mouldings, Cornices,* and other work requiring a hard and smooth surface, the Cement and Sand in equal proportions.

In gauging, great care must taken thoroughly to incorporate the water with the Cement and Sand, using it rather more freely than with Roman Cement.

Portland Cement should be used as soon as possible after gauging, and if found to set too quickly should be exposed to the air for some little time previous to its being gauged.
