**EXPLOSION AT THE HORGLAS FACTORY—DESTRUCTION OF PROPERTY.**—Cork, Monday. At seven o'clock this morning a terrific boiler explosion took place at the patent spinning mill and factory, a short distance from the village of Horglas. The factory is one of the most extensive in the county, and is owned by Messrs. Wallis and Gort. The explosion occurred while the men were engaged in repairing the engine with the water-wheel, it being driven by both steam and water power. The fire spread to the eastern portion of the premises, and there was a large quantity of both manufactured and unmanufactured hemp. In a few hours the factory was got under. Property and machinery to the value of several thousands of pounds have been destroyed. The premises were insured, but to what extent is not known. Four men injured; but, except one man, their injuries are not severe.

**INVESTIGATION AT CORK.**—Whilst the magistrates were deliberating on the evidence laid before them in connection with the threatening letters sent to Mr. Leahy and Galgey, a scene of a singular nature was witnessed in court. The female prisoners, their husbands and their brothers began upbraiding Mr. Leahy in a very violent manner, and evidently under the greatest excitement, the female prisoners crying loudly. This continued all the time the magistrates were absent, and Mr. Leahy at length retired to retire.
