He swore that he did not see the deceased standing within five feet of Philip; he heard the shot but did not see the deceased, he said, coming out of a doorway stooped his head at the moment to avoid the door-jamb; there was but one handle that but the act on to detail the conduct of "Philip" as before stated.

Dr. Rod and Sugrue, who made a post-mortem of the body, deposed that the injury was the cause of the death of the deceased was shortly addressed by the Coroner, who unanimously found the following verdict:—That Philip James Foley came by a sequence of gun-shot wounds inflicted on him at Carr, in said county of Kerry, on the 25th day of April instant. The wounds were feloniously and unlawfully inflicted on him by Philip Michael Foley of Killarney, who then and there fired such shot at and there, by such shot, inflicted such wounds on said deceased as to cause his death as aforesaid."

The inquest was held in the court-house, Killarney, on the 26th inst., and was crowded. Mr. Doyle and Leyne are in charge of the funeral of the deceased, which took place on the 27th inst. in this neighbourhood—hundreds of people attended, and expressed their sympathy for the untimely and melancholy death of the deceased, during his residence amongst them, for many years, had very much endeared him to them by his honesty and goodness of disposition.
